1.0 Introduction

The City of Alabaster is a 20.6-square-mile city located in north central Alabama, approximately 30 miles south of downtown Birmingham. Located in Shelby County, Alabaster is geographically characterized by mountain ridges and their associated valleys. Named after the white limestone originally mined in the City, Alabaster was officially incorporated in 1953.

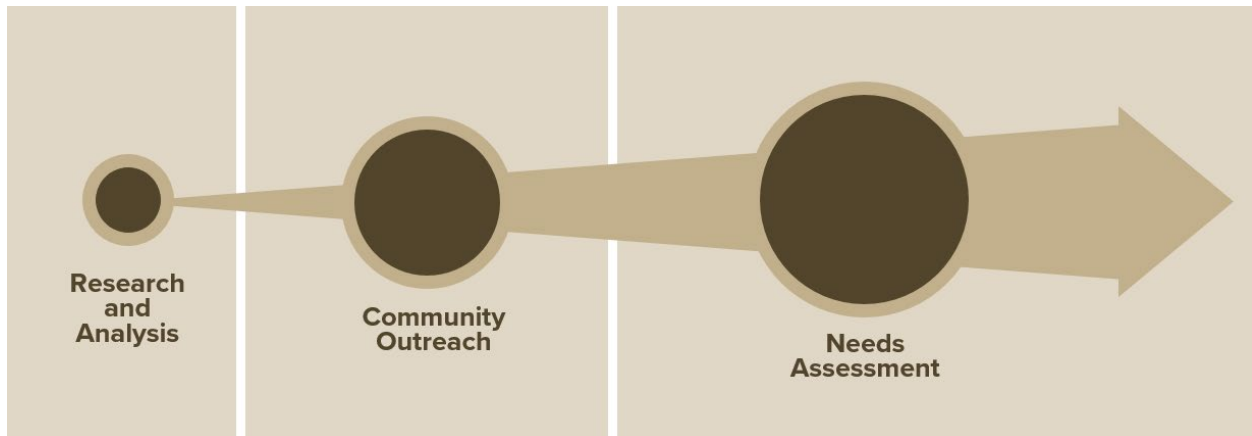
The City of Alabaster engaged Barge Design Solutions (“the consultant” or “consultant team”) to help create a Parks Needs Assessment. A Parks Needs Assessment differs from a Park System Master Plan in several ways. Traditionally, a Park System Master Plan is a five-phase planning process: Research and Analysis, Community Outreach, Needs Assessment, Development Plan and Recommendations, and Implementation Plan. The Park System Master Plan requires detailed research, site visits to all parks within a municipality, and focus group and public meetings, among other action items. The Park System Master Plan acts as a complete guide to aid communities in their parks and recreation planning over a set period of time, generally ten years.

Contrarily, a Parks Needs Assessment is only a three-phase planning process: Research and Analysis, Community Outreach, and Needs Assessment (see Figure 1-2). A Parks Needs Assessment gathers demographic information, as well as data about existing parks and recreation facilities, and collects input from stakeholders and the community in order to evaluate the needs of a particular park system. The resulting document will enable the City to assess their needs and make future parks and recreation planning decisions based on those needs and the wants of the community. The project description below further explains the phases and the specific information gathered during each phase.

Project Description

The City of Alabaster, Alabama, in cooperation with the consultant, produces a Parks Needs Assessment to evaluate the current park system level of service (LOS) and the future LOS that will be needed over the course of the next ten (10) years based on City-provided demographic data. The purpose of the project is to identify how the current park acreage and existing park facilities relate to the current and projected population. The plan also acquires input from park system stakeholders through a Stakeholder Workshop. Some of the information gathered from the focus group meetings is used to develop questions that relate specifically to the City of Alabaster for the Community Input Survey.

The three tasks of the Needs Assessment depicted in Figure 1-2 and described below can be performed individually, and each provides useful information on which the City can make decisions about the future development of the park system and/or individual parks. However, the three tasks build on each other in the order in which they are listed to provide Needs Assessment results that are based on data, park user personal input, and statistically valid community-wide input. The consultant team put the Needs Assessment scope of work together in this way to provide the City with options to move forward with all three tasks or any combination of tasks. All tasks are performed in-house by the consultant team, who are all experienced in park system master planning.

Demand/Needs Analysis

The City provides the consultant demographic data on the geography and population specific to the City, including projected growth figures for the time period of the plan: 2020 through 2030.

The City also provides the consultant team an inventory of parks and recreation facilities offered by City Parks, as well as other public and not-for-profit providers within the City.

The consultant team then assesses how the various demographic characteristics affect the recreational habits of the City residents and determines how existing park facilities could be modified to better meet the needs of those residents.

Based on the analysis of the demographic information, the evaluation of the current Level of Service, and the outcomes of the public involvement process, the consultant team prepared a Needs Assessment specific to Alabaster. This data provides the basis for determining the priorities and needs of the City for parks and recreation facilities, greenspace acquisition and protection, and the development of trails over the next ten (10) years.

Stakeholder Workshop

The consultant team works with the City of Alabaster to create a list of stakeholders to attend a Stakeholder Workshop. The consultant team plans the agenda, dates, locations, and related logistics for the meeting. As part of the Stakeholder Workshop, the consultant team prepares a presentation and facilitates an interactive workshop to gather critical input from the participants. The results are documented and the information utilized to help develop questions for the community survey.

Community Survey

The consultant team develops and conducts an online survey to support the public outreach goals of the plan. The survey is designed in close partnership with the City of Alabaster and input from the Stakeholder Workshop. The survey is conducted using a secure system that allowed for only one use per respondent's IP address. In this effort, the City promoted the survey using example text and suggestions for promotion in order to help achieve a representative demographic makeup of the City of Alabaster.

Questions on the survey are developed with input from City staff, stakeholders, and suggestions from the consultant team. After several drafts, the survey is approved, and a "pretest" is conducted to verify that all questions are understood and could be answered by respondents. The survey for the City of Alabaster Parks Needs Assessment includes 20 questions, some with multiple components. Once the survey closed, the consultant team analyzes the results and summarizes the data, which is provided in Section VII of this document.

2.0 Demographic Trends Analysis

Population

Alabaster's population is on an upward trend, rapidly increasing over the next two decades. In 2018, the population of the City of Alabaster was 33,340. By 2040, the population is projected to increase by 49% to 49,739¹. With a growing population, it is imperative the parks and recreation facilities and programs meet the demand. The parks and recreation system will need to strategically invest, develop, and maintain parks and recreation facilities in relation to current and future housing development areas.

Age Segment

The age of the residential population in Alabaster is relatively balanced among the major age segments, with the largest group being 35-59, making up 37.4% of the population; and the second largest group being 60 and older, making up 16.3% of the population. However, the median age of the City is becoming slightly older. In 2010, the median age was 35.6 to an estimated 36.2 in 2014.² According to 2018 U.S. Census information, 51.1% of Alabaster's population was female.³

Providing access to services and programs will need to simultaneously focus on multiple age segments, as different age segments have different preferences toward activities. The fairly balanced age distribution will require the City to continue to provide programs, services, parks, and facilities that appeal to all residents of the community.

Racial Composition

In analyzing the City's racial composition provided by the 2018 U.S. Census Bureau, the current population is predominantly White Alone, with 71.7% of the City's population falling into that category. The Black or African American Alone category makes up 14.5% of the population, representing the largest minority in the City. Additionally, 10.1% of the City's population is

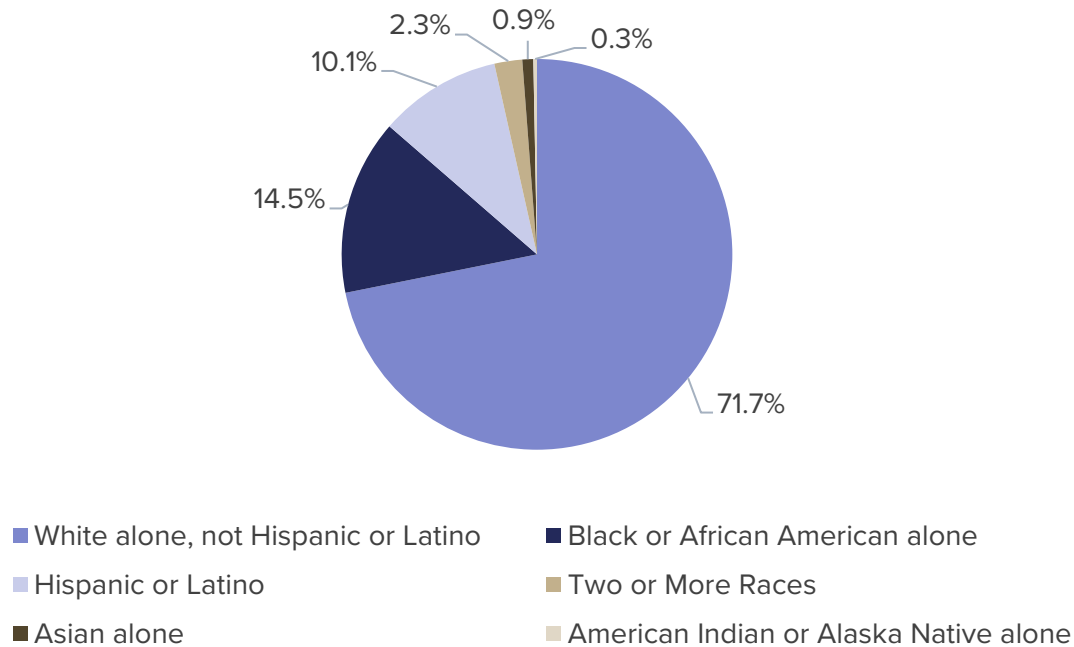

Hispanic or Latino. American Indian and Alaska Native Alone (0.3%), Asian Alone (0.9%), and Two or More Races (2.3%) make up the remaining 3.5% of the City's population.⁴

Median Household Income

From 2000 to 2014, the City of Alabaster's median household income increased from \$58,379 to an estimated \$71,905, a 23% increase. While the median household income for the state of Alabama has virtually remained unchanged during that time, the City of Alabaster and Shelby County have both experienced an increase in household median income. This is primarily due to comparably higher wage jobs, higher rates of economic mobility and opportunity, and a low unemployment rate among the City's labor force.⁵ The implications of this data suggest the City could consider options for fee-based facilities and programs, with waivers provided on the basis of need.

3.0 Existing Parks and Recreation Facilities

This section provides a brief description of City facilities managed by the Parks and Recreation Department. Table 3.1 shows the current park inventory by classification, along with their acreages. Figure 3.1 shows the locations of the parks within the City. The City of Alabaster's current inventory of park and recreation facilities includes eight (8) parks, totaling approximately 284 acres.

Figure 3-1: Existing parks and recreation facilities in Alabaster

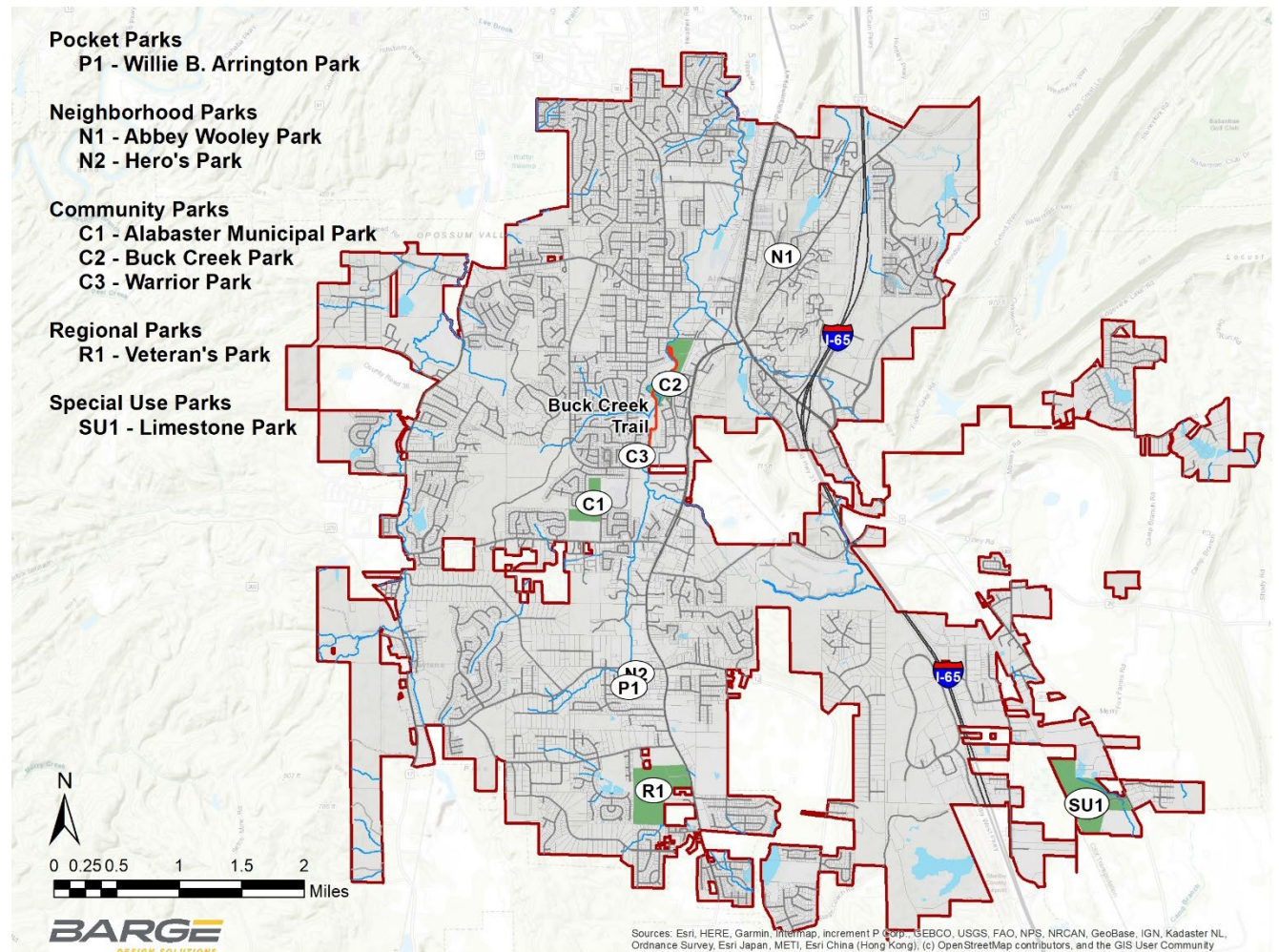
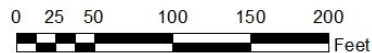


Figure 3-2: Willie B. Arrington Park

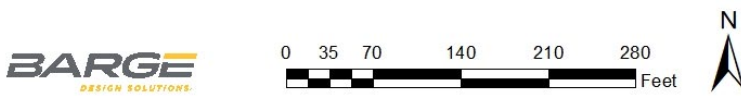

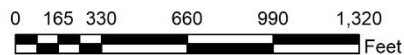

Department-run programs at Buck Creek Park include youth tackle football, youth soccer, youth baseball and softball, and adult softball. The City is considering updating the playground and potentially adding a splash pad in a central location as part of the City Hall renovation project. Other improvements may include a new pavilion, repairs to the walking track, netting for ballfield fences, new field fencing and adding LED Lighting. The Buck Creek Trail should be extended.

Limestone Park is part of the Alabama Birding Trail. Currently, the Department does not oversee programs at the park, and no major projects are currently planned for Limestone Park.

In addition to the improvements noted for each individual park, the City is considering adding the following elements to a piece of property referred to as the Mountain property. The proposed projects could include a tree top ropes course, zip line course, and hiking trails. Programming at this site could include canoe/kayak classes since it has water access.

In the next section, underserved areas by parks are identified. When planning and allocating funds for new improvements, the City should work to acquire new park land as outlined in the next section. The City should also look to improve existing trails in the parks and expand them. Capital improvement funding and maintenance should be identified for all the improvements noted in this section and include new facility projects, such as a new recreation center and developing improvements at the old YMCA property.

4.0 Level of Service Analysis

Level of Service (LOS) standards are guidelines that define service areas based on population that support investment decisions related to parks, facilities, and amenities. LOS standards change over time. As the population increases, the need to acquire additional land and develop parks also increases, as does the cost for doing so. Additionally, the LOS standards should be viewed as a guide. The standards should be utilized with conventional wisdom and judgment related to the particular situation and needs of the community. These standards should be used to make informed decisions-makers when planning to develop new parks, facilities, and amenities.

The consulting Team evaluated LOS standards using a combination of resources. These resources included National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) guidelines; community and stakeholder input; and general observations. This information allowed standards to be customized to the City of Alabaster Parks and Recreation Department.

The standards include a recommended service level based on acreage for each type of park, for total park acreage, and for important outdoor amenities (pavilions, baseball fields, multipurpose fields, etc.) based on quantity. The standards include a current LOS based on a population of 33,340, according to the U.S. Census Bureau⁶, and a recommended service level in 2030, and 2040 based on population growth projections from the City's Comprehensive Plan Update.

By applying the LOS standards to the population of Alabaster, gaps and surpluses in park and facility/amenity types are revealed. Currently, there are multiple needs to be met within Alabaster to properly serve the community now, as well as in the future. Alabaster currently provides a total LOS of 8.5 acres of developed parkland per 1,000 residents based on the City's 2018 estimated population. Developed parkland describes any park that is open to users of all abilities and that has infrastructure in place to support safe park use. Those uses may include, but are not limited to, parking area(s), restrooms, and basic park amenities such as trails, open play space, etc.

Alabaster is fortunate to have a sizable amount of parkland, primarily in the form of regional and special use parks but based on National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) guidelines, park land of other types are deficient. After much consideration, the consulting team recommends increasing the overall LOS standard from 8.5 to **10.0 acres/1,000 population** as a goal. This means that currently, the City is **deficient by 49.5 acres** of developed parkland.

To keep up with the growing population the City will need to acquire 142 acres by 2030 and roughly 214 acres by 2040 to achieve the recommended standard (see the following table).

Acquiring new parkland could occur by City land acquisition or dedication of land by a private owner or a public/non-profit agency. Development by the private sector that is not dedicated to the City would not be included in the calculations unless it was open to the general public.

However, just adding land is not the intent of the recommendation. The key is adding certain types of parks and in strategic locations. When comparing the inventory to the recommendations, it is easy to see that the largest park type deficiency is in the open space/conversation park category. There is also a need for pocket parks. It is important to highlight that simply adding acres to the system will not address the recommended goals. As Figure 5-2: Service Area Gaps shows, the parks need to be distributed throughout. The next table provides recommendations for outdoor amenities level of service.

By using these standards, the consulting team calculate the surplus of facilities (in green) and the deficiencies (in red). As the table below shows, more than half of the categories are deficient. In the short-term, the largest need appears to be multi-use trails/greenway (paved) and tennis courts.

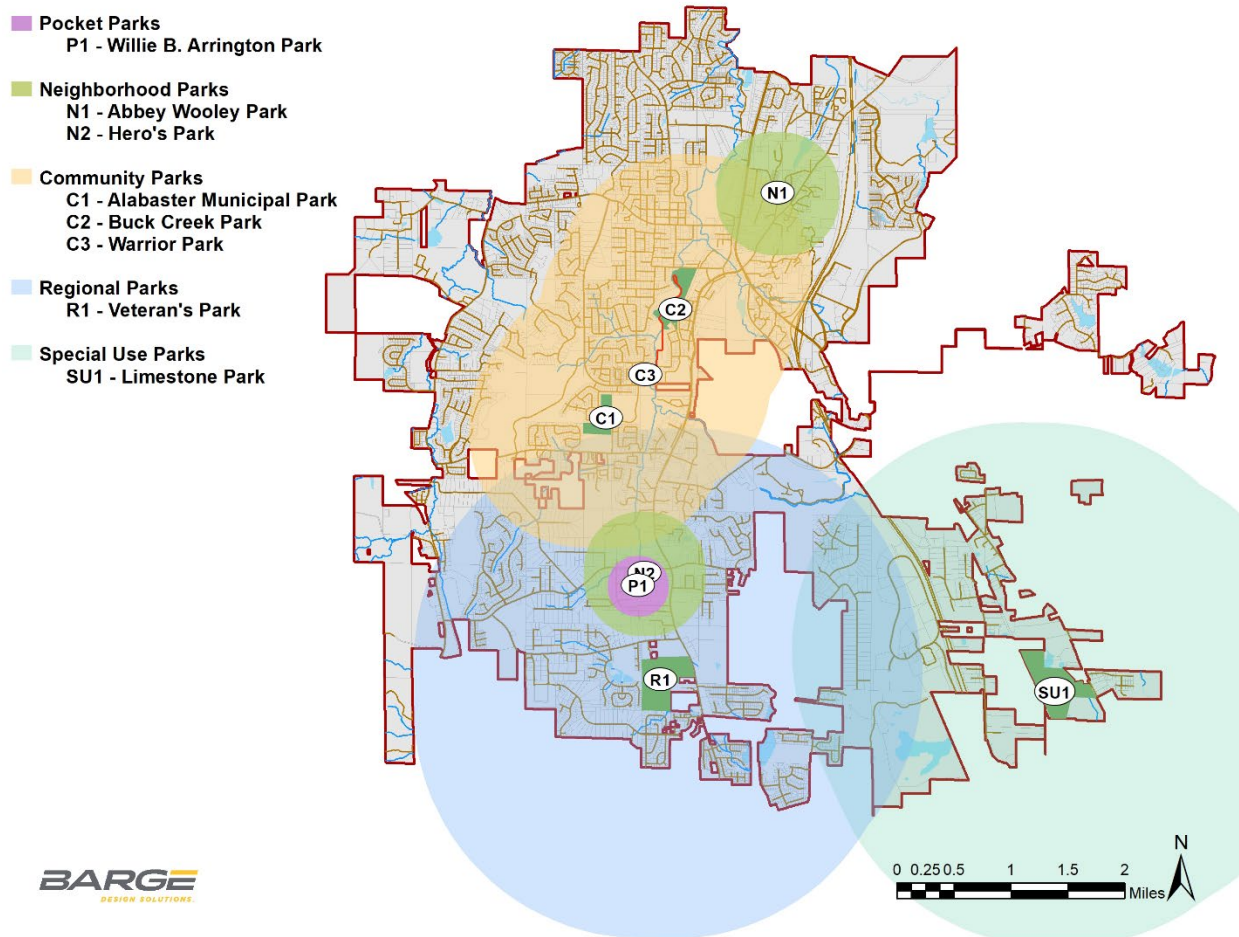
And while recreation center is actually an indoor amenity, the table includes it with a conservative recommendation of 50,000 square feet in size. The City does not have a recreation center, which is pushing the demand onto schools and other providers. Throughout the input gathering process, the consulting team consistently heard the desire for indoor recreation space with meeting rooms and other amenities.

5.0 Service Area Analysis

Figure 5-1 illustrates the service radii around the existing City-owned parks used for recreation. Given that much of the City is more urban or suburban residential in character and could have a pedestrian network, it is a reasonable goal to locate a park within a short walking distance of all homes in Alabaster. Park space within walking distance is an important element in providing quality recreation experiences and in increasing the health and fitness of community residents. People will walk down the street to a park after dinner to exercise or let their children play but are much less likely to do so if they must get in a car. Generally accepted standards for how far people are comfortable walking to a park indicate 1/4 mile is acceptable, and 1/2 mile is the maximum distance people are typically willing to walk. This assumes that there is a safe sidewalk or trail that can be used; otherwise the distance does not matter as people will not walk when it is not safe.

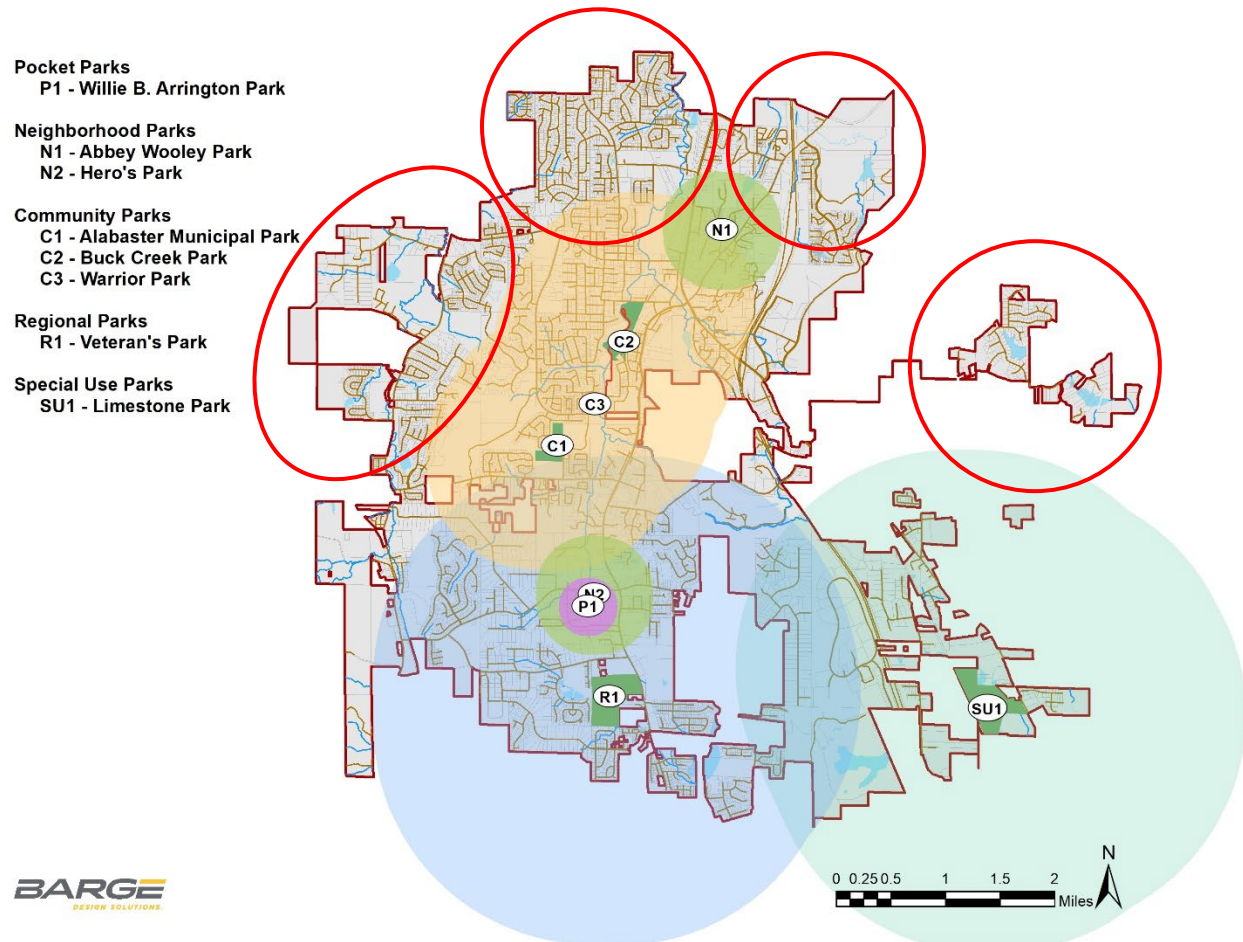
When analyzing the service area, it is important to consider where homes are located. In less populated areas, having gaps in service is acceptable. In more populated areas with gaps, the consulting team recommends adding parks.

7.0 Online Survey Results

Next, an online survey was launched on January 25, 2020, and closed on March 10, 2020.

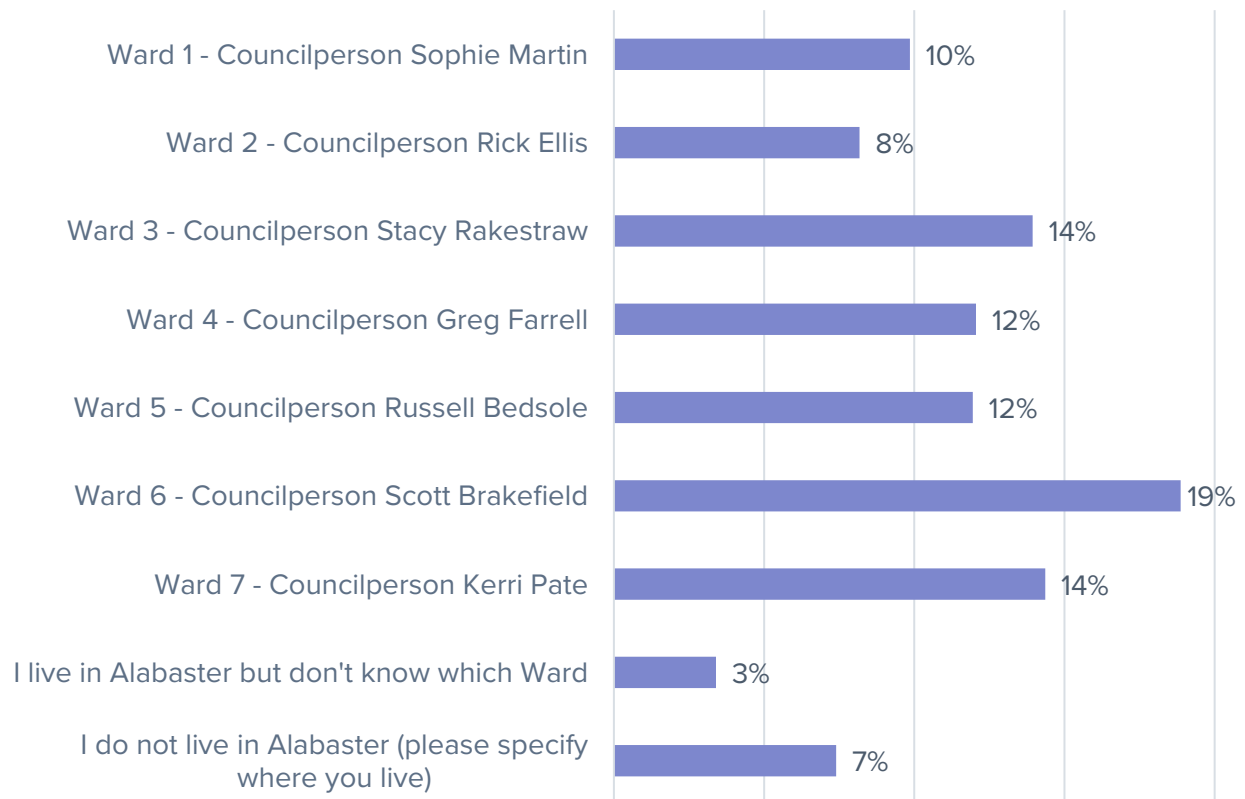
Questions for the survey were developed based on input received during the focus group and public input meetings. The consultant team worked with Alabaster Parks and Recreation staff during a back-and-forth review process to refine questions. The survey was promoted through various methods including direct emails, social media outlets, and promotion in a monthly newsletter sent to 11,000 households.

The target response level was a minimum of 380. The survey exceeded that goal with 1,140 online responses and 33 paper surveys, for a total of 1,173 surveys completed. Based on this simple metric, we have a confidence level of 95% and confidence interval of 2.8, which means that we can be reasonably confident that these results represent the opinions of the community by ± 2.8 points of the results provided. However, we also review the demographic information provided. While this information is optional and relies on the honesty of the participants, we can compare the statistical significance of the sample. Using this comparison method, the consultant team can determine if there is a difference in how certain response groups answered various questions. During the analysis, we did not find cases of statistical significance between gender, race, and residents. We specifically compared the questions related to the desire for new programs and facilities. Minor differences in preference are noted in the analysis on the following pages.

Location and Demographics of Respondents

In the survey, we included several demographic questions and a residency question in order to determine if we were able to reach a typical representation of the community. The residency question was near the end of the survey and asked, “In which Ward in Alabaster do you live?” Respondents were able to select from a list, and a link to an Alabaster Ward map was provided for those who did not know in which Ward they live. The highest response was Ward 6 with 18.9% and the lowest was Ward 2 with 8.2%; however, the consulting team did not find a vast difference in the overall responses. While some responded that they do not live in Alabaster, they then noted in the comments that they live in Alabaster but were not sure in which Ward they live. In the chart below, the consulting team decided to separate those responses, which total 3%. Many of the written responses included a note that the person worked in the City or lived just outside the City limits. Within this 7%, several noted that they live in Calera, Montevallo, Maylene, or other locations outside the City.

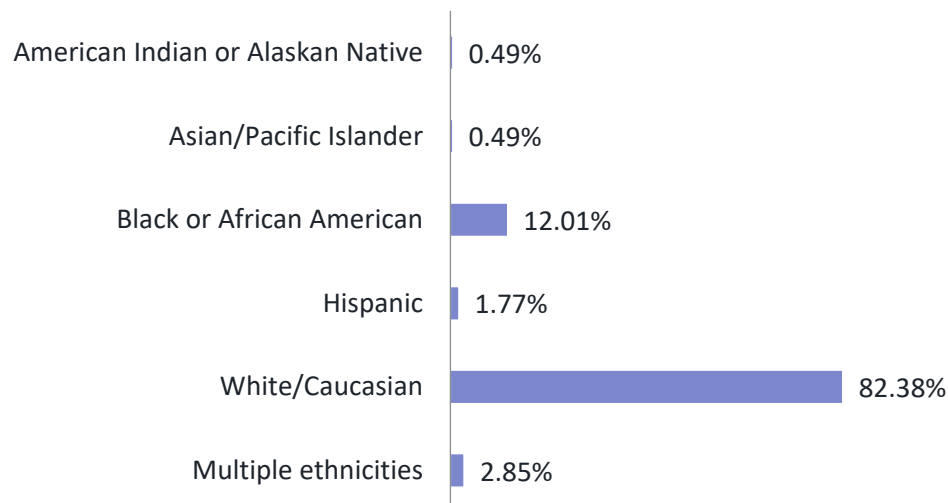
Figure 7-1: Respondents’ Location



In addition to asking where respondents live, we asked about their gender. In the results, we find that females represent the majority at 67%, with 33% male respondents. Based on the U.S. Census Bureau, the female population in Alabaster is 51%. While we have a disproportional number of females responding, many of our questions asked about opinions of the household. In our experience, we often find that females are more likely to take online surveys. During our analysis, we isolated responses from males and females on several questions to determine the statistical significance between groups. Unless noted below in the question analysis, gender does not appear to alter the outcome of the overall results.

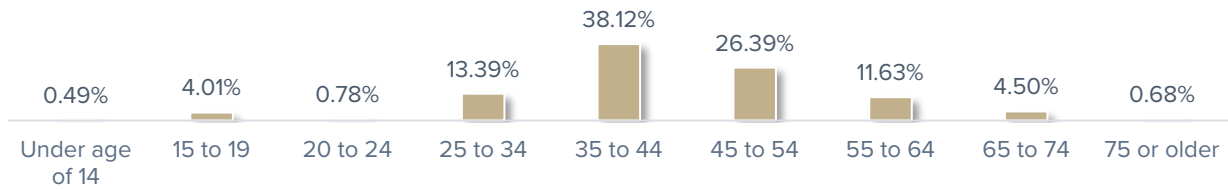
Similarly, we analyzed several questions for statistical significance between groups due to the disparage of race and ethnicity of respondents, with White/Caucasian at 82.38%. The reason for asking this question it to determine if we were able to reach a typical representation of the community and, if not, were their opinions about parks and recreation in Alabaster vastly different from the other groups. We looked closely at certain questions, such as the desire for new programs and facilities. If differences in preference where found, they are noted in the analysis on the following pages.

In addition to gender and race, we asked respondents to provide their age. The majority responded with 35-44. According to the U.S. Census Bureau 2016 American Community Survey, the median age for Alabaster is 35.6, and the largest age group is 35 to 44, with 60 and older being the second largest age group.

And within the households, respondents were asked to provide the number of children by age living in the home. Approximately 32% of respondents answered zero or skipped the question. Of the roughly 68% responding, the largest group was 6 to 12 years old, and the smallest group was five years old and under. In addition, a respondent noted that they have an adult child who lives with them. It is important for the consultant team to see a variety of household types taking the survey. Overall, the consulting team was pleased to see a healthy mix of households ranging in age, with some having young children, some mid-range, and some with older children, as well as households without children or growth children.

Are Parks and Recreation a Priority?

Where a community spends money makes a strong statement about its priorities. In order to determine how the community rates parks and recreation, the survey asked how parks and recreation rated compared to other priorities in the community, such as schools, infrastructure, public safety, etc. Incredibly, a **total of 75.5%** rate parks and recreation as important (72.4%) or more important (3.1%) compared to other priorities in the community, such as schools, infrastructure, public safety, etc.

Figure 7-4: Priorities

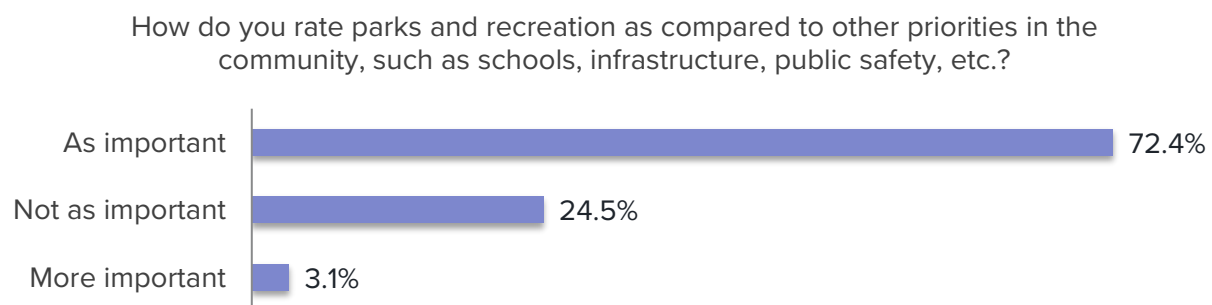
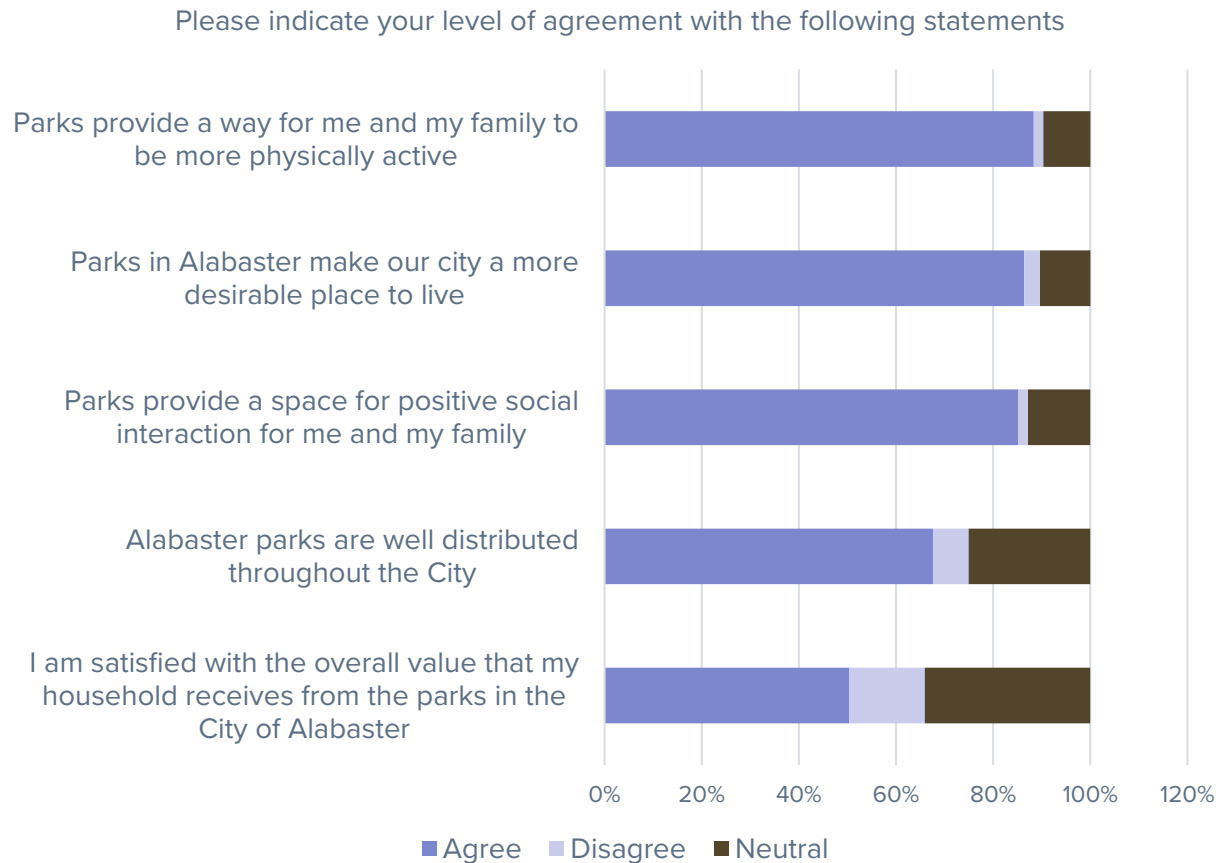


Figure 7-5: Opinions on the Role of Parks in the Community

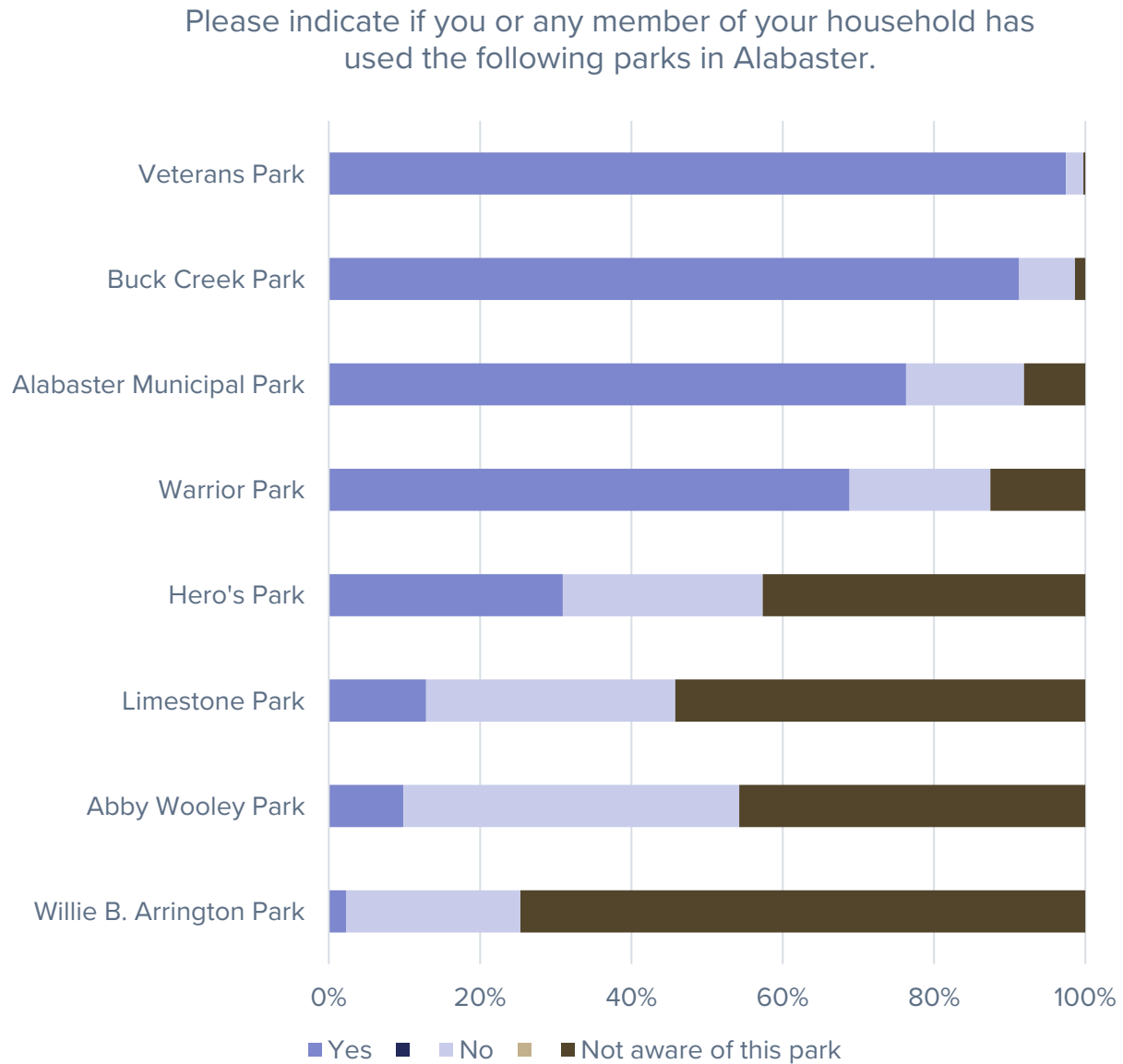


As part of the same question, the survey also asked respondents if they would be willing to volunteer to help improve the parks. Roughly half of the respondents agreed that they would volunteer, while 41% were neutral, and 9% selected the option that they disagreed with this statement.

Park Usage

To understand what parks are being used by the respondents, we asked respondents to indicate if they or any member of their household has used the following parks. The most used park, based on survey input, was Veterans Park, with 97% of respondents replying that they or a member of their household had used this park. This is not surprising considering that Veterans Park is a regional park with recreational offerings ranging from team sports to a dog park, catering to a wide array of levels and interests. Buck Creek Park was also noted as being used often, with 91% of respondents indicating their usage.

Desire for Programs

Programs provide a conduit to engage the community in a variety of activities. To learn what programs Alabaster residents desire, we asked respondents to indicate if they or any member of their household currently use parks and recreation programs listed below. We find youth baseball/softball at the top of the list, with youth soccer, football, and basketball/volleyball also mentioned as programs currently used. These responses align with input provided by the stakeholder group related to needs for a variety of youth sport facilities and programming.

Community special events followed, and based on our experience, we typically find these community events rank high.

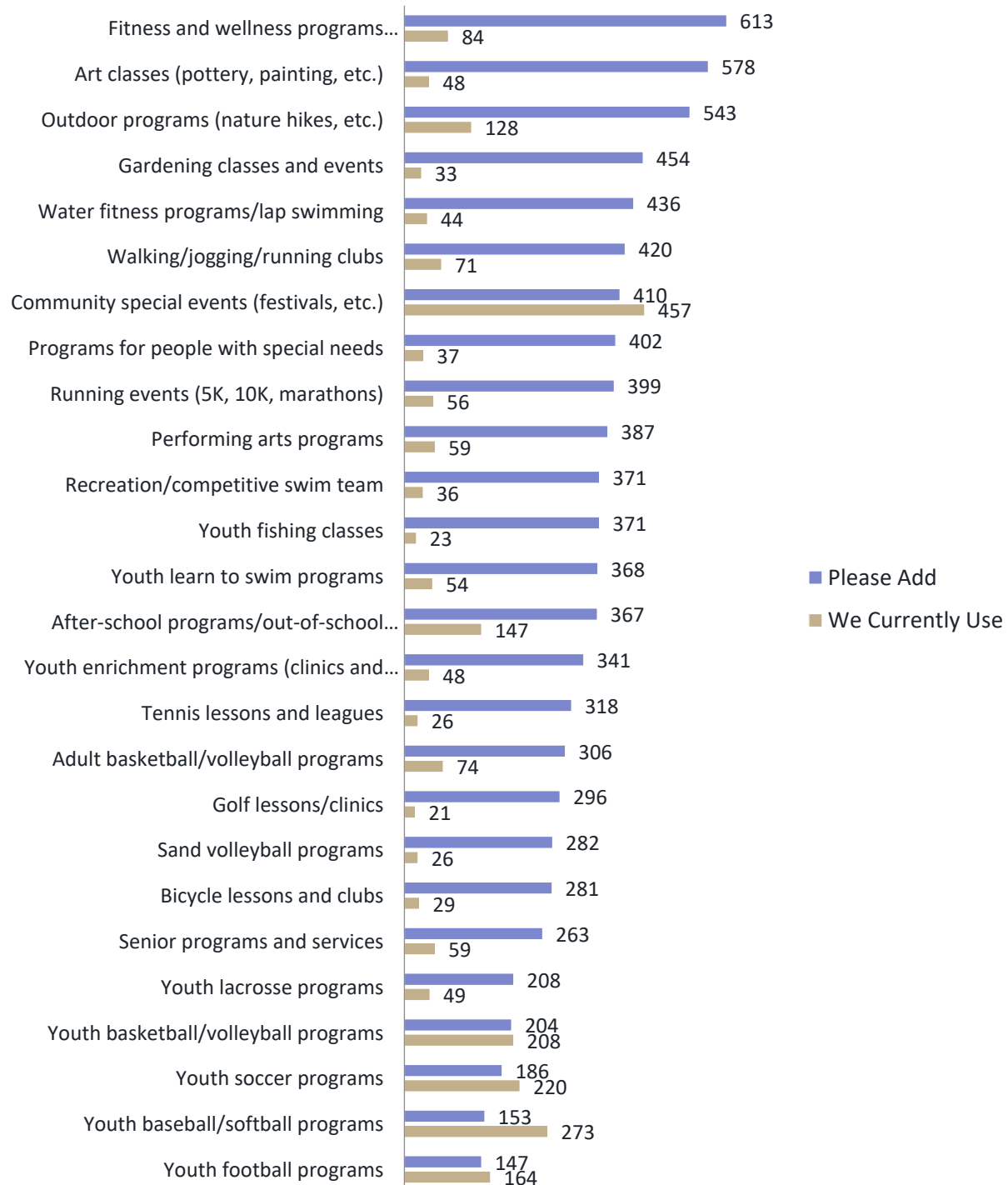
We asked respondents to indicate the programs that they would like added in the future, along with other non-sport programs where it is easy for any level of ability to participate. A desire for fitness and wellness programs was indicated. The variety of the top ten aligns with discussion from stakeholder engagement and it is important to note that it includes a desire for programs for people with special needs, which is part of the mission of community parks and recreation programs to provide opportunities for participation by wide segments of the community.

Desire for Facilities

To determine the desire for facilities, both existing and not, we asked survey participants to indicate if they or any member of their household has a need/want for each of the parks and recreation facilities listed below. We find the number one desire is for walking and biking trails (paved), followed by a desire for restroom buildings in parks. Enhancements such as pavilions/picnic sites and playgrounds are also in demand.

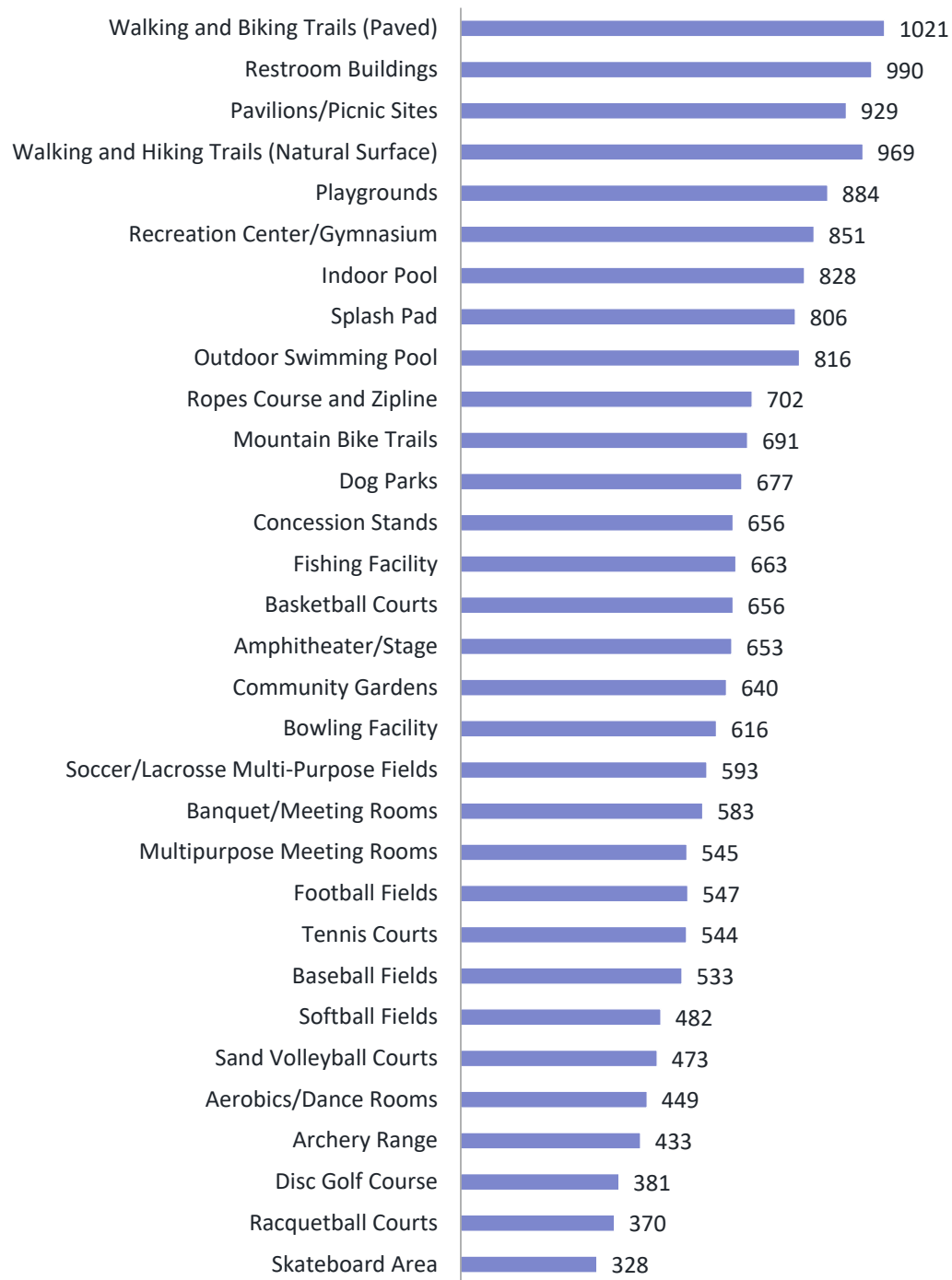

With the high ranking of paved walking and biking trails and restrooms, we believe that the Parks and Recreation Department would have strong support for adding these facilities at existing parks. The top five items listed were similar when comparing responses from male and female. When comparing results from majority and minority races, with one difference, the responses were similar except for indoor pool outranking walking and hiking from residents that identified as Black or African American.

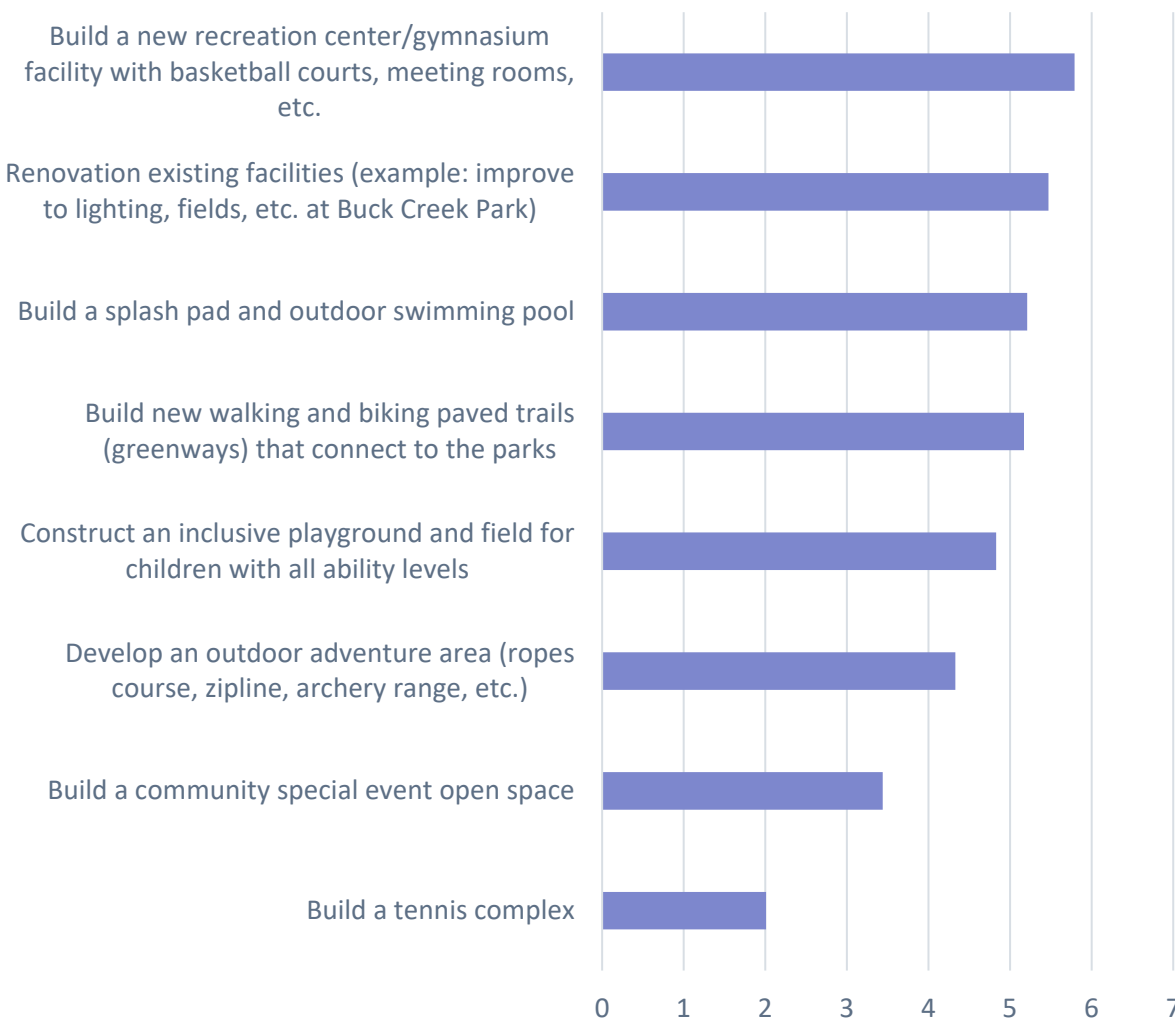
Figure 7-8: Desired Park Facilities

Please indicate if you or any member of your household has a need/want for each of the Parks and Recreation FACILITIES listed below by checking either "Yes" or "No" Yes



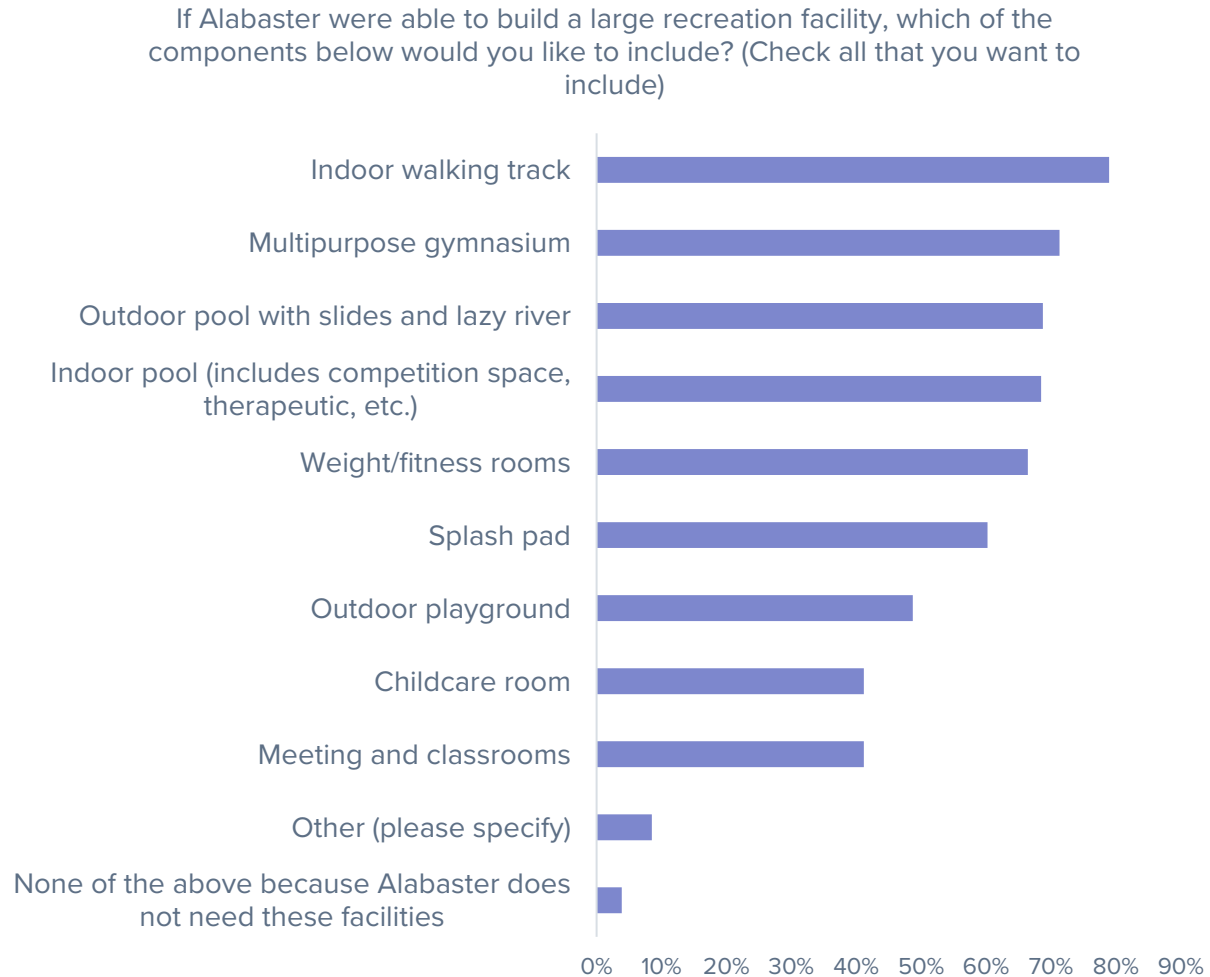
Next responders were asked to help prioritize the improvements. The options were developed from the results of the stakeholder meeting, where a number of "dream big" ideas emerged for the future of the parks and recreation system. From the list below, respondents were asked to rank them in order from 1 to 8, with 1 being the highest priority. The results were close, but the highest ranked improvement was to build a new recreation center/gymnasium facility with basketball courts, meeting rooms, etc. While the lowest score was for building a tennis complex, it still received a lot of votes. Currently, the community has a deficit of tennis courts and a strong desire for building new courts; however, the overall support for a larger tennis complex is a lower priority based on the results of this ranking question.

Next, the survey included a question to find out what components residents would like to have if the City were able to build a large recreation facility. Indoor walking track ranked the highest on the list.

Figure 7-10: Desired Recreation Center Components

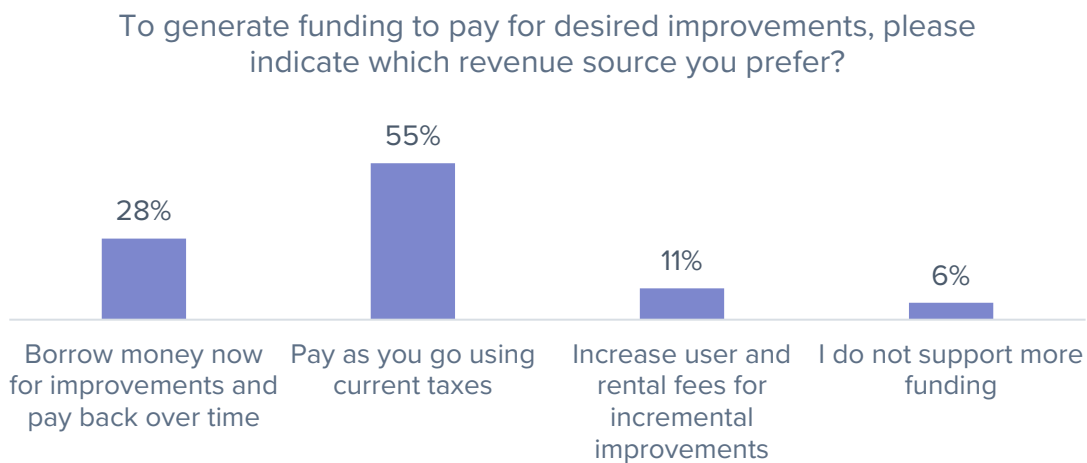


Items not mentioned in the provided list but were mentioned by several under "Other (please specify)" included tennis courts and archery range. The comments also included the need for soccer, lacrosse, and football fields. There were also several unique ideas, including a climbing wall, racquetball courts, disc golf, bike racks, pickleball courts, snack bar, game room, and facilities for special needs. And while it is not related to parks and recreation necessarily, four comments request recycling or a recycling center.

Funding

The critical issue in every parks and recreation system is how to fund new parks and maintain what is currently existing in Alabaster. To understand the respondents' point of view on funding, we asked them to indicate which revenue source they prefer. Fifty-five percent (55%) of respondents chose paying as you go using current taxes. Next, we find some support (28%) for borrowing money to pay for improvements and paying it back over time. A small percentage (6%) do not support more funding of any kind. The Department will need to look at a combination of approaches as budgets tighten and the demands on the system increase.

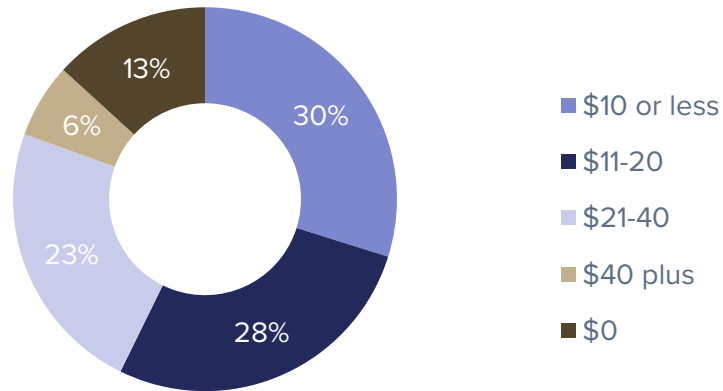
Figure 7-11: Funding



Next, we asked, if Alabaster were able to build a large indoor recreation facility, how much would they be willing to pay per month to utilize it. Close to thirty percent indicated that they would pay \$10 or less, followed by 28% indicating that they would be willing to pay \$11-20 per month. A group of 13% indicated that they would be unwilling to pay anything for these services.

Trail Connectivity

From the stakeholder input and responses to the other questions in the online survey about the desire for new facilities, responses have indicated a desire for citywide multiuse trails. Many communities have used these trails to leverage economic benefits in their community by providing connections from residential areas to nearby businesses and/or attractions such as parks. We asked if residents would like to see more multiuse paths connecting parks, businesses, and area attractions. A large majority (89%) support these connectors in the community.

Figure 7-13: Desire for Multiuse Paths as Connectors

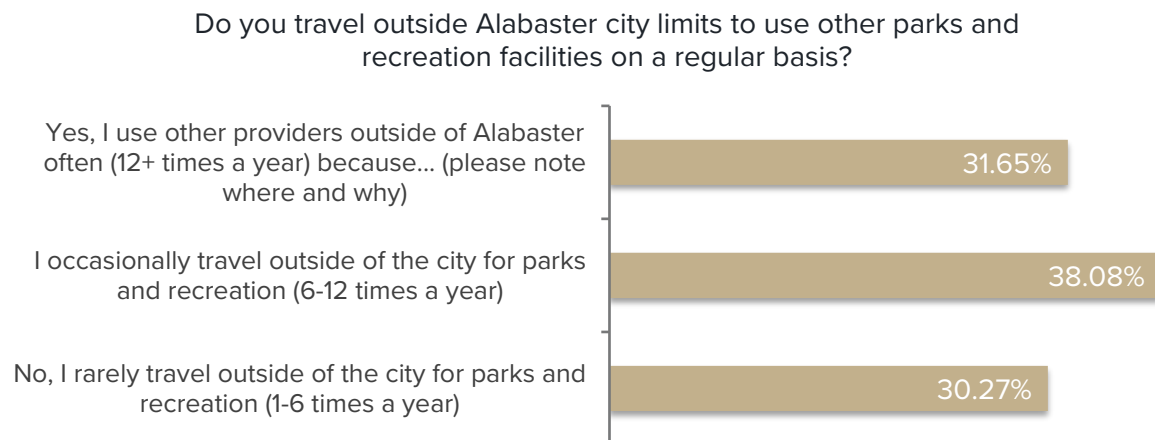
Would you like to see more multiuse paths connecting parks, businesses, and area attractions?



Other Park Providers

As part of our research, the consulting team wanted to find out if respondents are traveling outside Alabaster city limits to visit other parks and recreation facilities. We asked, “Do you travel outside Alabaster city limits to use other parks and recreation facilities on a regular basis?” The results are split roughly equally between the three options (see Figure 7-14: Travel to Other Park Providers), with slightly more indicating that they do occasionally travel outside the City for parks and recreation (6-12 times a year). Compared to past studies in other communities, the amount who travel 12+ times a year is high. Open responses indicated that they are travelling to parks in the surrounding area, such as Birmingham, Pelham, Hoover and Helena, because these places offer amenities not found in Alabaster.

Figure 7-14: Travel to Other Park Providers



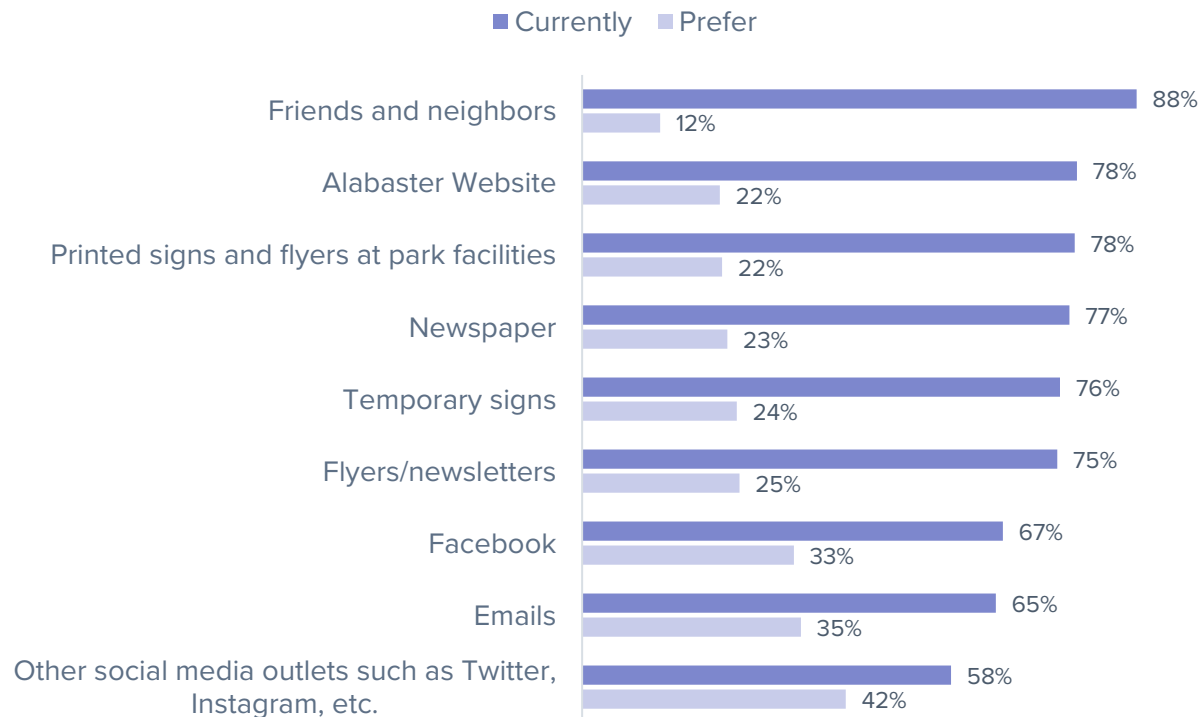
Communication

Next, we asked, “Which of the following ways do you learn about recreation programs and activities in Alabaster? Please check all that apply.” Alabaster Parks and Recreation Department uses a variety of communication methods to engage the community. To determine which methods are reaching the respondents, we asked what ways they learn about programs and provided a multiple-choice list. From the responses, we find that most are learning about happenings through friends and neighbors (88%), looking at the Alabaster website (78%), and/or looking at printed signs and flyers at park facilities (78%) to find out what activities are available.

Newspaper, other flyers and signs, email, and social media are also noted as places where respondents frequently learn about programming and events.

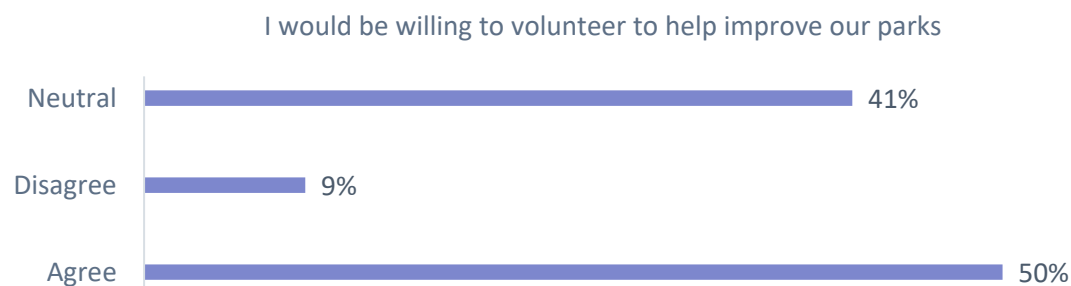
Figure 7-15: Communication

The survey also asked respondents if they would be willing to volunteer to help improve parks. Notably, 50% indicated that they would be willing with 41% neutral and only 9% unwilling to help.

8.0 Needs Assessment Summary

Based on results from the stakeholder meeting, the online survey, and the level of service analysis, it is evident that the residents of Alabaster desire more places to walk/jog/ride bikes (multiuse trails), greenspaces to enjoy with their friends and family, and they would like to have restrooms at many of the parks. The consulting team recommends the City acquire new park land as the community continues to grow and they will need to add staff to management and maintain the new park facilities and activities. Below is a short-term priority list of the recommendations.

DRAFT Priority List:

- Maintain existing facilities (fields, playgrounds, etc.)
- Provide sidewalks and multi-use trails that connect residents to parks
- Provide indoor gym space with meeting rooms
- Build picnic areas and restroom buildings
- Expand the park acreage from 8.5 to 10 acres per 1,000; begin by acquiring conservation parkland with greenways and trails
- Use a pay as you go approach utilizing current tax revenue

While the Parks Needs Assessment identifies a number of deficiencies, the City of Alabaster has many assets and accomplishments to be proud of within their current system. The community residents are engaged, and the City has strong leadership focused on improving parks. Building on the strengths to address the needs will be critical as the City moves forward to meet the growing demand for parks and recreation in the community.

Online Survey Additional Comments, Questions, or Concerns

One of the final questions on the survey, we asked an open-ended question. We had approximately 280 comments. The ones that said “none”, “NA” or did not pertain to Alabaster were removed from the list below.

- *Would love to have free access to indoor walking track*
- *Please add addition to senior center- we do not have enough room. The noise is loud sometimes you cannot hear in the senior center!*
- *I would like to see sidewalks on streets for safety.*

- *One of the biggest issues with our parks is they are not kept up. Mowing grass is fine but trash pick up is lacking esp. after a tournament at Vet. Need to honor veteran's better at Vet Memorial....*
- *My husband & I use Alabaster Senior Center regularly. We would like to see an expansion of the crowded building as somedays it's packed.*
- *We need a bigger library. The Alabaster YMCA should start taking silver sneakers*
- *We enjoy the flowers and greenery the city provides. Keep your grounds maintenance guy we like him-very knowledgeable.*
- *I love Alabaster- the library the parks the events! I love outdoor areas but I really want a splash pad here, so we don't have to drive. The kids should be able to see other kids from our community.*
- *Municipal Park soccer fields have been an eyesore for years. My son has played city league and competitive soccer on these fields and have always been in bad condition compared to other cities' facilities. Each year the field conditions to get worse. Please make these a priority.*
- *Need to expand library facility. Better park maintenance.*
- *Restrooms at the municipal soccer fields are embarrassing!! No one wants to use the ladies. Please tear this down immediately and build a nicer facility. This is an IMMEDIATE need with our soccer program as large as it is. Please visit Calera's facilities for comparison.*
- *Please widen 119. Traffic is terrible in the evenings*
- *Better scheduling of sports practice (ex: basketball). Why can't there be steady nights for practice. I didn't like not knowing when my child had practice each week. It often co flicks with other activities my other kids were doing, and we ended up missing because of last minute scheduling and practice inconsistency.*
- *We have several special needs children in our area, we need a Miracle League Field and inclusive playground for these children*
- *I have a special needs child and we have NOTHING in our community for those children. A MIRACLE LEAGUE FIELD AND AN INCLUSIVE PLAYGROUND FOR STARTERS.*

- *Love the direction the city is going. Proud to call Alabaster home.*
- *Recycling drop off locations?*

- *Would like to have programs for adults with special needs.*
- *I would love to see more children's party and play facilities. Pelham has a trampoline park, bowling, ice rink, pump it up, etc. Alabaster has nothing. The Splash pad, rec center would help though.*
- *Need more options on the North side of town*
- *Child care options are greatly appreciated by parents and a potential money maker for the city.*
- *It's fun to dream big, but none of these things are truly necessary.*
- *We need to bring more things for families and teens...roller skating, bowling, arcades....*

We also need space for wedding receptions or parties...

- *I do wish there was a better job done running the football program. Last year multiple kids quit the 5th grade team before the end of the year. The 4th grade team split up and half the kids went to Helena due to a disagreement with coaches. The 3rd grade team only had 15 kids which was way down from the year before. If we are going to continue to have an excellent High School team we are going to need to continue to develop them when they are younger.*
- *I don't think that it would be fair to charge a per/house fee to build because of the households that would not use it.*
- *We love Alabaster! More adult programs and activities like kickball, volleyball would be great.*
- *Please build an indoor pool!*
- *More hiking trails, bike paths (especially off the road) or start making Alabaster bike friendly, more sidewalks/trails (especially to schools) from surrounding neighborhoods,*
- *Alabaster's growth has and will continue to be strong! But keeping tax dollars here and families happy in the summer months is important and having a place year round to have events can open many other community opportunities!*
- *I really enjoyed the kickball league that started last year at Veterans. Would like to see it expanded to a Spring, Summer, and Fall league.*
- *Making the city more accessible by walking or biking would be amazing. We currently live about a mile from Thompson high. My daughter spends an HOUR on the bus in the morning and afternoon. I'd much rather have her walk or bike to/from school if it were a safe pathway. Creating bike lanes and sidewalks on main roads would increase physical activity, provide social opportunities, and potentially increase neighborhood/city wide involvement.*
- *As a longtime resident the road infrastructure continues to be a concern also, the tax revenue should be able to cover this expansion also I see job opportunities with the city for people to run, up keep facilities. I enjoy all the current park options in Alabaster in the past my children were very involved in rec programs. having a community fitness center like hoover would be great!*
- *I would like to see more investments in what the city offers to the entire community in places like the library.*
- *Buck Creek is lacking for youth football compared to every other field in the league Most charge admission to help the facilities we don't most parents don't mind paying the admission if it's to improve the park. A youth field away from the train tracks would be ideal so play isn't stopped for trains*
- *More healthier restaurants, for example Newk's, Zoe's. Can Alabaster inquire about getting a Whole Foods or Sprouts? And a skating rink and/or bowling alley?*
- *RECONSTRUCTION ON ROAD 119 BY SMOKEY ROAD PLEASE GET DONE FASTER!!! (4 lanes)*
- *Widen 119 before adding activities to Veterans*
- *Soccer fields are in terrible condition. Disproportionate funding for baseball vs other sports.*
- *Sidewalks!!! Can we please get some along Thompson road and warrior dr? Kids could walk to from school that live nearby if there were sidewalks.*
- *The biggest problem with Alabaster is that it is SO car-centric. People can't get anywhere in the city without a car. You have thousands of homes within 2 miles of our schools and no way to get to school without a car or bus. You cannot get from one park to another by bicycle or by walking/running. We need trails and greenways...*

- *A splash pad is a terrible idea!!! They require so much maintenance and the people they attract are just looking for somewhere to let their kids run with little supervision! I have 3 young children and we do not visit splash pads often bc they are overcrowded and hard to keep clean. However, a beautiful park and place for families to walk, play and gather would be amazing. I playground for kids of all ages, nice walking and biking paths, a small BMX bike track would be wonderful! Our current facilities could use a little TLC. Warrior park need attention. We okay baseball there and the fields are rough ... not to mention the bathroom!! The soccer field are atrocious here!! There are bald patches they aren't level and ant hills in the fields. It's embarrassing having people travel from all over to play on those fields!!! We have the Y with a pool. I feel like the liability and up keep of a pool is over the top when we need better parks!! Vet is nice! The exiting is a nightmare during baseball season. The park is nice but there are not enough swings or things for older kids to do. It would be nice to have a basketball court there but that would increase traffic issues. The current city basketball plays in the old TES gym - the bathrooms are gross and those facilities are so old. Then you travel and play at new Calera schools - 😊. Would love a dirt BMX track for bikes like what is at Oak Mountain*
- *I'm very disappointed in the quality of life aspects the city has at this time. We are a very stagnant city and as a longtime resident, I've watched Calera, Chelsea, Helena, and Pelham surpass as with activities and facilities for their city. As an adult, I do not want to have to use a school system facility to play basketball, tennis, etc. I am sad to see so many tax dollars sunk into a city garbage service when our community needed a Rec Center, walking trails and other quality of life aspects that we would use on a daily basis.*
- *More than ANYTHING, we need SIDEWALKS and CROSSWALKS that connect our neighborhoods to their neighboring schools! Our schools are embedded in residential areas, and our kids are constantly walking in muddy and unsafe areas before and after school. We need sidewalks and crosswalks on Thompson Road, Warrior Drive, Kent Dairy Road, County Rd 11, and 12. Also connect our neighborhoods to ALL CITY PARKS with sidewalks and crosswalks. Make our city more pedestrian friendly and the family and active life here (as well as SAFETY) will be extremely attractive to all future businesses and residents.*
- *Municipal Park's facilities need improvement. They are an embarrassment when hosting soccer teams from other cities.*
- *We need sidewalks on Thompson Road and in the high school!!! Those kids have NO WHERE to walk! It's embarrassing that we spent that much money and didn't provide a safe way for them to get there.*
- *I know they are set to make improvements to Abbey Wooley, but I wanted to emphasize the atmosphere around the park. I live within walking distance and have barely used it (in fact my husband is uncomfortable with me taking our baby there) because it doesn't feel safe. I don't think many in our neighborhood do. It is little known and doesn't get much traffic/passers by outside of the 2-3 immediate communities. While you're working on it please consider these aspects. Good lighting and maybe an emergency pole (with the button to call the police). I was so excited to live so close to a park, but I've barely used it since we moved here due to our first bad experience.*
- *Fix 119 south before you add anything anywhere. Doing that would provide much more recreation and health benefits to residents who live near Veteran's Park than anything else. Even if it only saved 30 minutes a day for a round trip commute over a year that would add several days back to every resident's free time.*
- *Recreation Center is a must for the City of Alabaster*
- *I would like to see something done and enforced about dogs being in playground areas - especially at Veteran's Park. Even on leashes, dogs should not be permitted in that area. I've also seen dogs being allowed inside the fences around the baseball fields during tournaments.*
